Keeping a Sketchbook: An Artist's Plan for Self Care

One of our greatest challenges since the onset of the pandemic has been translating our projects and programs in the virtual world. We moved quickly and managed to move things onto Zoom, and have been adjusting our projects and conversations ever since. We wanted to encourage our teen artists to incorporate art-making into their daily lives, and not just while we were online together. In this moment, we had some good karma coming our way, and were introduced to our new friend Becky.

Becky Rutherford is an artist and educator who has taught and worked locally at the Camphill School for over 25 years. Her work is founded in the belief that art-making is an intrinsically healing process.

She has taught and worked all over the world. Becky agreed to join with Barnstone as a visiting artist for our teen program, Emerging Voices. Becky's presentation, "The Who, What, Where, Why, and How of Sketchbooking" was a hit. She introduced our artists to the practice of keeping a daily sketchbook, and shared examples from her own books. Her practice included beautiful drawings, but were also a peek into her daily life. She drew and wrote about the things happening around her, and her experiences of the world. Together we discussed how making art daily is a truly reflective, satisfying and healing act. Barnstone is so lucky to have such amazing friends, and we are grateful to Becky for this wonderful presentation!

Pennsylvania Moves Toward Being More Trauma-Informed

Governor Wolf has recently announced that our state is moving closer to incorporating trauma-informed thinking in its planning and operations. The work was highlighted in an article from our friends at ACEs Connection.



The plan focuses on six key areas (excerpted from www.acesconnection.com):

- 1. Ensuring that PA state culture is trauma-informed through universal training
- 2. Ensuring all state agencies' policies and practices are trauma-informed and more focused on prevention and healing
- 3. Mandating that all licensed and funded entities become trauma-informed
- 4. Building and supporting grass roots / community-based efforts to become trauma-informed in every part of the commonwealth
- 5. Recognizing and healing from the traumas of major crisis like COVID-19
- 6. Preventing and healing racial, communal and historical traumas, whether they be individual or systemic

This move will bring awareness and sensitivity to the myriad issues surrounding the impact of childhood trauma. The effort, through the state Office of Advocacy and Reform, is using many of the same resources that Barnstone uses to organize and think about this work. We are grateful for this effort, and look forward to seeing the results in our government services and funding priorities.
